## Tomorrow's Women's Leaders

For the last 2+ decades, <u>Tomorrow's Women</u> (TW), a U.S. 501(c)(3), has been the only crossborder peacebuilding organization in Israel, Gaza, the West Bank, and U.S. exclusively invested in the potential of young women as a pathway to peace. We've trained 700+ women to engage in Track II diplomacy—unofficial communication channels and conflict resolution programs between ordinary citizens that address historical traumas and complex grievances, rebuild relationships, and result in more durable and robust co-existence.
